When Gary & I married he already had two Chessies. In fact, the morning of our wedding day, he had to go pick up Toby from being bred at Grousemoor Kennel. We kept a female from that litter. She turned out to be more my dog than Gary's, so I consider her MY first Chessie. Her name was Ch. Irish's Shining Duchess - Jackie.

Now I'll back up a bit, to the winter before we married. Gary taught me how to show dogs with his first Chessie Toby - Ch. Irish's Shining Princess. She was very easy to show and never acted up, kept her feet right where they belonged. I made my show debut at the Detroit Kennel Club in 1981. Toby was entered in Best of Breed. I wasn't nervous at all, or so I thought. The second I walked through the gate into the ring, it felt like my temperature went up 20 degrees, I couldn't wait to get out of there. Toby performed great, I did everything I was supposed to do. When I finally walked out of the ring, Gary was waiting for me. I immediately handed him the lead and told him "I will never show another dog again", and walked away.

Fast forward to 1986. That puppy we kept, Jackie, was now almost 5 years old and was a very well put together bitch. I said to Gary one day, "Why don't you show Jackie, don't you think she is nice?". He told me, "I think she is very nice, but she's your dog and if you want her shown you'll have to do it yourself". So I did. I never had that bad case of nerves like I did my first time showing. Jackie finished fast, earning Best of Breed from the classes, she won numerous Veteran classes including at the 1988 National Specialty where she also earned a JAM. She passed away at a little over 14 years old.

I met my dear friend Robin about twenty years ago at a group home we both worked at for severely Developmentally disabled adults. We worked the midnight shift together, and every night she would bring her dogs to work. I had never seen a Chessie before or even heard of them. I soon fell in love with her dog Jessa. She was always so gentle and loving to the Residents. They would light up when she came to greet them, and she would sit by their wheelchairs and lay her head in their laps. At meal times the residents could be pretty messy so Robin would call the cleanup crew and the dogs would come running to clean up every last crumb of food on the floor. The more I got to know her dogs I knew this was the breed for me. In 1993 Robin gave me my first Chessie for my birthday from Jessa's last litter. She was a deadgrass just like her mother. I had a difficult time coming up with a name. Nothing seemed to fit, until one evening I was outside playing with her when I noticed that she had discovered her shadow. She was jumping around trying to catch it, so she became my Shadowdancer. She was one big bundle of brown fluff. She loved to go everywhere with me. Nothing ever seemed to bother her. When she was four months old we traveled out west through many states with Robin and three other Chessies. They all traveled well with each other. We saw a lot of interesting wildlife, elk, bear, moose, buffalo, which never seemed to phase any of the dogs. The dogs especially liked hiking through the mountains with us.

When she was six months old I started showing her in conformation. That proved to be quite a learning experience for both of us. I made a lot of mistakes but she always forgave me. She loved to retrieve for me and would bring anything I threw for her back. Although her favorite thing to do was swim; that is when I learned about the stubborn deaf ear side of a Chessie. I would stand on shore calling and bribing but nothing was more enticing than the water to her. Eventually she would come out at her leisure so I would have to be quick and grab her; I always ended up soaked. The years rolled by and when she was eleven I took her in to the vet to have her leg checked. I never thought it would be anything serious. When the Dr. came back into the room to talk to me I could tell by her face it was bad news. She showed me the x-ray that revealed bone cancer. She then informed me that bone cancer is very aggressive and most dogs only have about fourteen weeks left. So we went home with medication to make her comfortable. I started to prepare myself for the day I would have to

make the decision of euthanasia. I prayed that she would go in her sleep so I would not have to make that decision, but in the end I held her head in my lap and said good bye to my best friend as the Dr. gave her the shot that would stop her pain. I will forever miss her.
