Reproduction Seminar

The MCBRC sponsored a Reproduction Seminar on 2-5-11. Dr. William Schultz was scheduled to present. I was in charge of taking care of the details and handling the sign ups.

The week leading up to the seminar.

Wednesday I was thinking how lucky we were that the Big Storm came early enough in the week that it wouldn't affect people traveling to the seminar. Then I got a call from Dr. Schultz's office saying that he just had hip replacement surgery but that he was 99% sure he would still be there to present the seminar - figuring in was no big deal, he would just get around in a wheel chair. Later that day, his office called to say the doctor told him he would NOT be doing any seminar on Saturday. He arranged for Dr. Malinak to present for him. I contacted everyone that had signed up to let them know of the change. By Thursday all but two said they would still attend. So I'm now thinking, whew! Everything is still going to be okay. Come Thursday night however, our female that was not due to have puppies until the following Tuesday, decided otherwise. Her temp had dropped to 97.8. When Friday arrived, her temp was down to 97.2 she still hadn't delivered, and it was looking like I would not be making it to the seminar either. I asked Tina if she would mind taking over my duties at the seminar. She gladly agreed. I then contacted my regular vet to give her a heads up about the pending puppies in case there were any emergencies related to the whelping. She informed me that she would not be available if anything major was needed as she and her husband were just in a car accident. So now I'm thinking "great, all my vets are out of commission". I called Schultz's office to see if anyone there could handle an emergency if needed over the weekend. Dr. Malinak said I could call her if needed. Well, at 3am Saturday, after 45 minutes of frequent hard contractions, the first puppy arrived. By 8am the last one came. I managed to get to the seminar, was a bit foggy from lack of sleep, but I made it. Gary stayed home to monitor mom & babies.

Seminar Time

Dr. Malinak presented a power point covering everything from what to look for when picking your foundation animal, heat cycles - regular and abnormal. Sperm quality, its abnormalities and treatments. Testicular & prostate conditions and treatments. Reproductive abnormalities of both males and females including tumors, cysts and infections. The importance and timing of brucellosis testing. The timing of a breeding using a combination of progesterone, LH testing & cytology. The various options in artificial insemination procedures and much more were discussed. She even ended up having me tell my whelping story as an example to why you need a plan and even a backup plan when you have a bitch due. There was also a Q & A portion.

All in all, we had a good turnout with 9 club members and 17 non-members attending. I received good feedback and everyone seemed pleased with the information provided. The event paid for itself and made \$610 for the club.

He turned 2yrs old December and this hunt was
January 13-14 2011. The Outer banks are on the
coast of South Carolina where Joe's mom & dad
live. Joe has had Chessie's all of his adult life and
is retired from GM. He lives with his wife, Beau
and horses Grand Rapids way. This letter below
is what he sent me.

Hi all!

This year's hunt in the Outer Banks was one for
the record books. Although some of the
shooting was less than stellar, there were some
shots that will live in my memory for a long time.
On the first morning we were slated to hunt with
Matt Paulson in a spacious blind on the
Currituck marsh. This was my first hunt with
Matt and I found myself a bit apprehensive as
Beau did not get a lot of retrieving this past duck
season because the number of ducks where I
usually hunt were not as abundant as usual. You
always want your dog to do his job with vigor and
speed, but that is rarely the case specially working
with a retriever that still has some puppy in him.
Matt put my fears to rest as I found him to
understand and tolerate those mistakes that
young dogs will occasionally make. Our hunt
started right off a couple of minutes after legal
shooting time as a Gadwall drake decoyed into
the set and Dave Lange (my partner) and I
dropped him outside the decoys. It was now that
I was uttering a small prayer that My big Chessie
would do his job and retrieve the duck. It took
but a minute or so to finally get him lined up on
the duck and he did a great job but got himself
tangled up in a string of decoys and ended up
dragging around ten or so decoys behind him.
Matt got him untangled and Beau finished the
retrieve and delivered the bird to hand... I knew
by then that this would probably be a special
day...

The next group of birds that came in were Green
Winged Teal. There were around 20 birds in
this flock and I scratched one down that dropped

in the decoys and Dave Dropped another that
sailed out into the marsh. We sent Beau into the
marsh but could not locate the bird so we got the
other bird before it drifted out into the sound.

After a short while Matt asked if he could take
Beau back out and look for the lost bird. I was
thinking that the duck had run off but said yes
because there was always a chance that we had
not checked the right area because I did not see
the bird drop and Beau was working mostly with
me. A couple of minutes later Dave and I heard
a large "WOOP" from Matt as Beau located the
bird around 50 yards from where we were
searching and to add frosting to the cake, the
Greenwing Teal was banded!

As in most blinds there is always a "discussion" on
who should get the band. It is always a big deal to
add some "bling" to the call lanyard and this was
no different. As Matt had the boat and was our
only way back to dry land it was decided that he
should get the band, and he took it with
reverence.

The rest of the day went like a dream and we
collected four Green Wing Teal, six Greater
Scaup, a Black Duck, and a Gadwall. Another
day that will live in my memory for many years to
come. Beau did not disappoint... He's my
bud....

I would like to thank Matt for putting me at ease
and even asking to work with Beau on a few
retrieves. You can always tell a dog man when
you see them. He is one of the best that I've met.
I WILL be hunting with him again!

The second day dawned chilly and windy. A
kind of day that you know the birds will want to
move in to stay warm. This day Dave and I were
hunting with Vic Berg, the owner of "Outer
Banks Waterfowl" in the Oregon Inlet on his
marsh where you get a great view of Bodie
lighthouse.

This area covers vast areas of ankle to knee deep
water with grass that the ducks love to dine on.
As we were waiting for shooting time we could
hear Gadwalls, Teal, Pintails, Swans, and
Widgeon calling all around us. I had a good idea
that this was going to be another great day.

The only glitch in this scenario is that the area
that I normally hunt in Michigan is similar and I
quite often have trouble getting "Mr. Chesapeake"
to want to retrieve the ducks without poking and

playing with the ducks before HE decides it is time to retrieve them. Today was no exception... After while, on one of the retrieves, I decided not to go out and do a photo shoot and remained in the blind as I needed to dig for more shells. Beau RAN out of the blind, picked up the bird, and RAN back to the blind with the duck gently cradled in his mouth. Go figure... I still wonder who was training whom....

Beau also had a notable blind retrieve in the marsh from a Gadwall taken by Vic. I was looking in one area where I thought the bird might be and could not see Beau as the marsh grass completely covered him. I finally saw the grass moving about twenty yards away from me and then everything went still. A few seconds later I saw Beau leap from the grass with the drake in his mouth. That horse of mine located me, made a bee line to me and delivered the bird to hand... To say that I was proud of this big dog would be a gross understatement. I love this dog...

The day ended well as we ended up with a dozen ducks consisting of Pintail, Gadwall, Ringnecks, Scaup, and Widgeon. With a gorgeous sunset and Tundra Swans settling in outside the decoys, we ended two days of fantastic waterfowling. Good times, good friends, and a good dog. For as long as I live, it is going to be really hard to repeat these two days. I am blessed.

Storm Stories

It was a cold November morning that we decided to try our luck at Harsen's Island Waterfowl Reserve. Fellow hunter Jerry, myself and Storm crossed the North Channel by Ferry to arrive for the 5:30am draw. There were 85 parties of determined Duck Hunters waiting for their number to be drawn. The lottery started and we were picked 14th, as the prime hunting area's around the Reserve were quickly taken, we managed to get a Dog Area. These areas are restricted for hunters with dogs only.

We launched the boat as Storm positioned herself at the bow of the boat. We motored down the channel to our hunting area kicking up ducks left and right. Storm's intensity level was peaking at this point. We arrived at the large strip of flooded corn right next to the Reserve. We set out 70 decoys to simulate an extension of the Reserve, trying to outsmart those wily birds. The decks and dog stand were set; everyone was in position waiting for shooting hours to start.

The ducks were moving to and from the Reserve, but not working the decoys. It was starting to look like a pass shooting kind of a day. We had a single Drake Black Duck come from behind us as Jerry dropped him. Storm and myself did not see or mark the duck. Jerry explained the duck had fallen into some scrub brush about 40 yards out. As Storm and I waded to Jerry I knew that Storm would have to be handled to the duck. I lined her up and sent her with just a couple of whistle sits and handles, she found the Black. Storm returned with the duck, Jerry was totally amazed at her performance.

It was not long before another Drake Black came buzzing down the corn as I peeled off a shot. The duck fell into the Retrieving Zone of the Reserve. Storm entered the flooded corn working the area of the fall and came up with another retrieve. At this point we had our limit of Black Ducks; we now had to be selective as to what ducks to shoot at. The morning continued with only large numbers of Black Ducks working the decoys.

We picked up the decoys and headed back to the boat launch, we were greeted by another hunter. He was a Marine on leave from Afghanistan who admired and highly

complimented on what a nice Retriever Storm was. Even though we only bagged 2 ducks that morning, it was a memorable hunt.



Never happy, motored past the launch to the open and deep waters of the Cumberland River scouting for more ducks. The boat and motor much more at home here, titled down and throttle open we run 25+mph. We can hunt 8 to 10 miles up the river and into 3 or 4 creeks. Always learning, scouting and adapting to the birds. After 2-3 years of being "off my game" in the 2011-12 season the ducks need to take notice. I am back and they will pay. Cannot wait until the new season opens, (as I write this the TN duck season has been closed 48 HOURS).



Chili's Tennessee Hunt

After being a step behind the ducks the last 2 seasons in MI. I took the boat and new motor to TN duck hunting. Scouted back water creeks and the Cumberland River. Found birds in multiple places but the largest concentration was on a beaver pond a mile up a creek from the boat launch. This creek is wide but shallow in places not the best water for a 16' V-hull boat and 60hp motor, o-well title the motor up and idle on back to the ducks.

Chili and I set out from the launch about 9:30 am one weekday morning. Got to the pond and flushed over 100 ducks, they started coming back immediately. Shot 2 out of the 1st flock and then the birds started to work further out, so we moved. Shot another but the ducks were still spotting us, moved again. Shot 1 from this spot but again the birds were not cooperating, move once more. This time right spot and I shot a 2nd double to finish the 6 bird limit. The last 2 shots 35 and 20 yards. All gadwalls, 4 drakes and 2 hens, not bad for 2 hours of fun.

Rite of Passage

As the late afternoon of November 8th 2008 wound down towards the end of shooting hours a drake and hen mallard, wings set, just two or three feet off the water glided into the small stool of decoys. A shot boomed out over the water and the drake tumbled and fell, the hen unscathed as she scrambled to gain altitude and leave the decoys behind her. As she winged away upriver a camo clad hunter emerged from a shore blind with a young Chesapeake Bay dog at his side and turned towards the downed drake. Even though she was prancing with excitement and eagerness she never left her masters side and her eyes never left the bird as it lay on the water. The man brought the young Chessie to heel, lined her up, and sent her on the mark just as

they had done several hundred times before during training sessions.. This time though, they weren't training. It was the real thing, an actual hunting trip. Although there were no hard factors involved, no thick cover to negotiate, no dozens of decoys and anchor lines to avoid, it was never the less an important retrieve and a very important rite of passage for both dog and hunter. Her first retrieve in a hunting situation, no help from her human partner, just lined up and sent. And go she did, with a mighty splash and a grin that only a Chessie owner could appreciate.

She completed her retrieve at heel and softly to hand with, of course, that typical Chesapeake grin. As the man received the bird, he, also had a little grin. His youngest prospect was now officially a duck dog.

Man and dog turned and re-entered the blind where the hunter now examined his prize. Great, golf ball sized iridescent green head, deep chestnut colored breast, bright white ring around the neck, and two full curl feathers over the tail. A fully feathered and fully colored drake mallard. A beautiful bird. But wait, what's this? Something there on the leg. A closer inspection reveals a little bit of bling. Jewelry!! A band!! Not only a fully mature and colored drake mallard, but a banded duck as well. A very fine and fitting trophy indeed for a first retrieve!!

A quick check of the man's watch reveals only minutes left of shooting hours, and even though only one bird was brought to bag, it was a very successful day afield. Decoys are picked up, and the man and dog head home to a warm kitchen and dinner.

And now, as Paul Harvey would say, here is the rest of the story. After the info from Kate's band was submitted I received a certificate in the mail from the USFWS. Kate's duck was banded in Komoka, Ontario, Canada. Kate was born in Roblin, Ontario, just 200 miles east of Komoka. The duck was banded on August 29, 2007. My birthday is August 29th. This mallard was her first real retrieve, and after 30+ years of duck hunting, this was my first banded waterfowl of any kind ever. Lot of Karma wrapped up in the taking of one drake Mallard. Needless to say, that band was put on my call lanyard and has

accompanied me on all duck hunting trips to date since 11/08/08.
